Acts 12:24 Churches MEG Checklist – CMC Interview

The purpose of the CMC Interview is to get to know the candidate, and to gather a sense if God might be calling this person into the ordained ministry. The goal of the CMC Interview is not to ask every question that could be asked; nor to necessarily have a firm & definite "Yes" to ordained ministry. The CMC Journey is one of training, education, reflection, & discernment; and so, a "no" to CMC status is more likely for those for whom you are persuaded are not called toward ordination.

Prior to the Interview:

Passed a <u>Free Methodist History & Polity</u> course.
Been Received as an LMC.
A CMC Recommendation from the Lead Pastor
Approval is contingent upon a background check.
Timeline, post-interview, on a decision.
l, the Next Steps. The candidate will:
Attend a CDN Encounter.
Begin to Plan for LPFJ Coursework.

If the Candidate is Not Approved:

Communicate to the Candidate, by phone call with a follow up email **after** speaking to the candidate, the Next Steps:

Some Points for Communicating Non-Approval:

- Thank you for your desire to pursue and explore God's calling in your life.
- The CMC interview is part of a discernment process to help a candidate understand that calling.
- Based on our recent interview, MEG did not believe that the ordination pathway is what God is calling you to at this time.
- The decision is based on the ability to articulate one's calling, past fruitfulness, and identifiable gifts that would point to a call to ordained ministry.
- <u>Maybe</u>: The MEG did, however, think that the Consecrated Deacon track would be best fitted for you at this time. Your local pastor can guide and direct you into this.

Steering someone out of a perceived call to ordained ministry (if you are persuaded it isn't there) is not easy and has to be handled with care whereas not to devastate the individual. On the other hand, to not do it is a disservice to the individual, the conference, and the Kingdom.
